Further, vide notification dated May 7, 2018 of Corporate Affairs, the requirement seeking ratification of appointment of statutory auditors by members at each AGM has been done away, accordingly ratification is not required.

Felicitation of SHD Achievers in Board Examination:

The discussion centered on the role of FCC in managing family disputes and community issues, enhancing collaboration with community representatives. Yuv Utsav & NGO Mela:

On 3 November 2023 the Department of SHD hosted its XVII Yuv Utsav and NGO Mela with the theme "Sustainable Youth Development." The event attracted approximately 1300 children and youth from 46 NGOs. The Mela featured stalls showcasing products made by women and youth, and various competitions including folk dance, rangoli making, and creative writing. CDC Kalyanpuri won the trophy for the best performance. The event was inaugurated by Rev. Vasant Kumar Reuben and attended by several distinguished guests, including Mr. Dharmendra Prasad and Ms. Pamela Goswami.





Educational Exposure Visit for Youth at New Delhi YMCA Campsite Sattal:

From 27 November to 1 December 2023 the Department of SHD organized an Educational Exposure Visit to the YMCA Campsite Sattal for youth from all five CDCs. The five-day camp included adventure activities such as trekking, river crossing, and kayaking, aimed at fostering leadership qualities and peer learning. The visit was attended by 100 youth and 25 staff members, and was highly successful due to the excellent hospitality provided by the Sattal team.



Christmas Celebration:

On 19 December 2023, the Department of SHD celebrated Christmas with the children from all five CDCs at New Delhi YMCA. The event featured cultural performances and a nativity play, attended by approximately 850 children and 125 staff members. The programme was graced by the presence of Mr. J. A. Benjamin, President, New Delhi YMCA and other dignitaries. The celebration concluded with the distribution of Christmas gifts to the children, and appreciation was extended to the SHD team for their efforts.





Republic Day Programme:

The 77th Republic Day was celebrated across all five CDCs on 23-24 January 2024. The festivities included flag unfurling ceremonies and cultural programs featuring patriotic songs and dances. The celebrations were graced by numerous dignitaries, including Rev. Vasant Kumar Reuben, Chairman SHD, and local leaders.





Over 1000 children and staff participated in the two-day event, which also included distribution of sweets to all participants.

National Youth Day:

On 12 January 2024, the Department of SHD celebrated National Youth Day with an engaging session held at Y School of Music. The event featured both an online and offline component: Ms. Deepali Bhagwate, Senior Impact Lead-Programs at Idobro Impact Solutions, led the virtual session, while Ms. Parul Kamra, Communications and Outreach Lead for Project Baala, facilitated the in-person session. Titled "Together We Thrive: Youth Building Inclusive Communities," this workshop aimed to foster unity and understanding among young participants. Through interactive activities, thought-provoking discussions, and dynamic games, the session emphasized the themes of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI). It empowered attendees with essential tools and perspectives to build and maintain inclusive communities. The workshop saw active participation from 75 youth and 25 staff members from all Community Development Centers (CDCs). Following the session, youth from all five CDCs showcased their community mapping and mobility data to their peers.

Sports Day

On 16 February 2024, the Department of SHD organized an Inter-CDC Sports Meet at Jawaharlal Nehru Stadium. Children from all five CDCs competed in a variety of events, including running, relay races, ball throw, shot-put, long jump, three-legged races, sack races, tug-of-war, and lemon races. The event was inaugurated by Chief Guest Mr. J. A. Benjamin, President of New Delhi YMCA, and was attended by numerous dignitaries, including Mr. Aloke Michyari, Vice President of New Delhi YMCA; Rev. Vasant Kumar Reuben, Chairman of SHD; Mr. Francis Andrade, Vice Chairman of SHD; and other esteemed members of the SHD Committee. With a total of 510



participants and 100 staff members in attendance, the day was marked by spirited and enthusiastic participation from all CDCs. CDC Savda-Ghevra emerged as the overall winner, securing 14 Gold, 12 Silver, and 2 Bronze medals...



International Women's Day:

On 12 March 2024, the Department of SHD honoured International Women's Day with a special event for women from the Self-Help Groups (SHGs) of all five CDCs. The program aimed to celebrate the talents of community women, foster self-empowerment, and enhance self-confidence and personal development. Activities included Rangoli competitions, quizzes, talent shows, and dance performances. Women from the SHGs also set up stalls featuring handmade items, traditional spices, and food items. The event was graced by several distinguished guests, including Professor Pamela Singla, Former Head of the



Department of Social Work at Satyawati College, University of Delhi; Ms. Preeti, Councilor of Old Seemapuri; and various members of the SHD Committee. The program highlighted the success stories of SHG women and was well-received by all attendees.

Health Camps at Community Development Centres:

Free Medical Camp (ENT & General Diagnosis):

On 29 January 2024, the Department of Social and Human Development, in collaboration with the Department of PCT, organized a Free Medical Camp for ENT and general diagnosis at CDC Kalyanpuri. The event began with an opening prayer by Mr. Ashish Clifton, Secretary of PCT. The camp was attended by Mr. Aloke Michyari, Chairman of PCT, and Rev. Vasant Kumar Reuben, Chairman of SHD, who offered their greetings and appreciation. Mr. Francis Andrade, Vice Chairman of SHD, and other notable figures were present. The camp was a success, with 145 community members benefiting from the medical services provided.

Cervical Cancer Screening Camp:

On 23 February 2024 and 23 March 2024, CDC Sunlight Colony and CDC Karpoori Thakur hosted Free Cervical Cancer Screening Camps in partnership with the Rajiv Gandhi Cancer Institute and Research Centre (RGCIRC). The camp offered various services, including PAP smear tests, clinical examinations and blood pressure monitoring. Ms. Monica Singh, Programme Officer of SHD, visited the camp and discussed the possibility of extending similar services to other CDCs. The camp was highly valued by the community, with 217 participants (213 female and 4 male) taking advantage of the screenings.

Eve Camp:

On 15 March 2024, CDC Kalyanpuri organized a Free Eye Camp in collaboration with the New Delhi Center for Sight (NDCFS) Foundation. The camp focused on screening and diagnosing eye problems, offering services such as refraction tests, papillary reaction tests, and general eye condition assessments. The team from NDCFS, including Mr. Jagdish Chand and Mr. Vaseem, conducted the screenings. The camp was well-received, with 140 community members participating.

Eye, Dental & General Health Checkup Camp:

On 22 March 2024, CDC Daya Basti organized a comprehensive Free Health Camp in collaboration with Fortis Hospital Shalimar Bagh, Clove Dental, and Center for Sight. The camp offered eye, dental, and general health checkups, with 223 community members benefiting from the services provided by medical professionals from these institutions.

Medical Camp:

On 23 March 2024, CDC Savda-Ghevra hosted a Free Medical Camp in collaboration with Konark Hospital Nangloi and Sanjay Gandhi Hospital. The camp provided a range of services, including orthopaedic, dental, paediatric, and gynaecological care. A total of 106 participants, including children and their parents, attended the camp, which also offered free blood sugar, pulse, and blood pressure tests. The camp was highly appreciated, with some patients receiving further treatment referrals at a discounted rate.

Awareness Generation Programmes (AGP) and Workshops:

Throughout the year, the Department of SHD organized 74 Awareness Generation Programmes across all five CDCs. These programs focused on important issues such as the importance of education, youth and women empowerment, health and hygiene, and environmental issues.

Importance of Education and Rights:

Awareness Generation Programmes on the importance of education were conducted at all five CDCs. These sessions aimed to educate community youth and women on various topics, including financial literacy, adolescent counselling, peer pressure, women's and girls' education, and fundamental rights. Collaborations with organizations such as Magic Bus Foundation and the Juvenile Justice Board enhanced the impact of these sessions, benefiting 579 participants.

Youth and Women Empowerment:

Programs focused on youth and women empowerment provided valuable guidance on career goals, financial skills, cyber safety, and more. Discussions also covered girl's education, good parenting, and domestic violence. These sessions, conducted with various organizations and community experts, saw participation from 902 individuals.

Health, Hygiene, and Nutrition:

Awareness sessions on health, hygiene, and nutrition were held at all CDCs to address issues such as nutritious diets, breastfeeding, family planning, and disease prevention. The programs aimed to improve awareness of health practices and were conducted in collaboration with organizations like Parivar Seva Sansthan and Delhi Government Dispensary. A total of 1,421 participants benefited from these sessions.

Environmental Issues:

To promote environmental awareness, CDCs organized activities such as drawing and painting competitions, poster displays, and tree planting events. These initiatives, held in conjunction with World Earth Day and Environment Day, emphasized the importance of a clean and safe environment. The activities reached 193 participants.



DEPARTMENT OF STUDENTS AND YOUTH

Adventure Camp:

The Department of Students and Youth organized an enriching Adventure Camp at Sattal YMCA from 25 to 28 May 2023. The camp saw enthusiastic participation from 60 students who engaged in various adventurous activities such as trekking, flying fox, Burma bridge, river crossing, and campfire. An excursion trip to Nainital was also part of the itinerary, providing students with a memorable and thrilling experience.





Summer Camp:

A vibrant Summer Camp for children aged 8-12 years was conducted from 22 to 31 May 2023. This camp saw the participation of 20 children who immersed themselves in a plethora of activities including art and craft, karate, music, dance, pottery, swimming, non-fire cooking, puppet shows, and rain dance. The camp culminated in a grand finale on 31 May, where parents were invited to witness their children's performances and view the craft materials created during the camp.





Flood Relief Camp - Dry Ration Distribution to Flood Victims:

On 27 July 2023, the Department organized a Relief Camp to aid flood victims. A total of 100 packets of dry rations, including cooking oil, atta, rice, sugar, and water bottles, were distributed to those who had lost their homes due to the Yamuna River flooding and were living in government rehabilitation camps. The distribution was led by Mr. Sumit Gupta, Chairman of the Students and Youth Committee, along with other Committee members Mr. Oliver Joshua Jacob, Vice Chairman, Mr. Darius Singh, Mr. Tushar Richards, Mr. Morris Nathan, Mr. Dhiraj Bhalla, Mr. Rijin Varhgese, Mr. Feroze Khan, Secretary, and staff of the New Delhi YMCA.


Ride Towards a Sustainable Future:

Visit to Missionaries of Charity Home:



DEPARTMENT OF PROGRAMME, CULTURAL & TRIBAL (PCT)

Gracious Giveaway Initiative

In alignment with the scriptural teaching that "It is Better to Give than to Receive" (Acts 20:35), the New Delhi YMCA adheres to the principle of "Serving the Community for the Overall Development of Humanity." Embracing these core values, the Department of PCT spearheaded the "Gracious Giveaway" Initiative. This initiative saw generous contributions from the New Delhi YMCA Management, Secretary Cadre, and Executives, who collectively donated over 100



items, including clothing, shoes, crockery, children's apparel, household goods, electronics, and watches. Free Medical Camp: General Physician Check-Up and Diagnosis:



Reflecting Denis Waitley's insight that "Time and Health are two precious assets that we don't recognize and appreciate until they have been depleted," the Department of Program, Cultural, and Tribal Affairs organized a Free Medical Camp on 26 May 2023, at the Y School of Music Recreation Centre. This initiative was designed to promote the social and medical well-being of the New Delhi YMCA community.



A dedicated team of 10 doctors and medical experts, known as "The Caring Touch," conducted comprehensive examinations for over 100 New Delhi YMCA beneficiaries, including members, staff, executives, and workmen. The services provided included general health check-ups, dental treatments, eye examinations, and subsequent prescriptions and counseling. The event was inaugurated with a prayer by Mr. Noel Phillips, Associate General Secretary and concluded with a vote of thanks by Mr. Ashish Clifton, Secretary. The medical personnel were honoured with mementos and certificates in recognition of their contributions.

ENT & General Diagnosis:

Continuing our commitment to health and well-being, the Department of PCT organized a Free Medical Camp for New Delhi YMCA staff on 30 January 2024, at the Greater Noida Programme Centre. The event commenced with a prayer led by Mr. Ashish Clifton, Secretary, and was designed to promote the health of the New Delhi YMCA community. A team of 10 doctors from "ENTEGRITY" provided thorough examinations and diagnoses, including ENT check-ups and general

In the beginning it was a primary school mainly meant for the especially abled children. The focus was on the underprivileged and the specially challenged children. Gradually the need arose to start a formal school for the children, but it still continued to be a primary school.

Starting with the Kindergarten section for the specially abled students with a few students and a few staff members, the school has undergone immense changes during these few years and now the student strength has increased manifold.

The academic session 2023 -24 introduced classes X and XI with two streams i.e. commerce and arts. The activity-based curriculum is being adopted and executed by our dedicated team of teachers make learning fun and entertaining. Different activities and competitions are being conducted for overall development of our children from base level.

Achieving academic excellence is at the heart of our endeavour as educators. OLYMPIADS, QUIZ, COMPETETIONS & CELEBRATIONS:

Various programs and participation in Science, Mathematics, English, Social Science and General Knowledge itself is the biggest competition where a student competes to outshine others. It infuses a healthy competitive spirit through reward based assessment.

YMCA Public School, Nizamuddin, incorporates various quiz competitions in subjects like Science, Mathematics, General Knowledge, and other language subjects to encourage all-round development of the students.

Our school has done exceptionally well in most of the Olympiads and brought laurels to the school. 10 students became rank holders in the international level and have been awarded with medals and cash prizes. This academic year we have received tremendous support and participation from the students and almost 900 students have participated in various Olympiads. Out of these, 99 students received gold medals and nearly the same number moved to the second round and qualified for medals and trophies.

English Elocution:

Elocution refers to the skill of clear and distinct speech is highly important for students, therefore an elocution competition was organised by the Cultural Committee of YPS. It not only broadens the speaking skills of the children, but also makes them research and be aware of issues and happenings around the world. 60 students from classes VI—XI participated.


Teachers' Day Celebration:

The exposure visit was to sensitize the Diploma students about Autism Spectrum Disorder.

Teachers Training Institute for Special Education:

The Teachers Training Institute for Special Education strives to enhance the skills and knowledge of its students through practical exposure and focused training. This year, several significant activities and initiatives have been undertaken to further this goal.

Exposure Visits and Internships: On 20 October 2023, the first-year students of the Diploma in Education (Intellectual and Development Disabilities) program visited the Blind Relief Association on Lodhi Road. Opinion

 - (a) The software used for maintenance of sales & other records for the hostel services (which is part of maintenance of accounting records) of the Company did not have a feature of recording audit trail (edit log) facility.
 - (b) The audit trail was not enabled at the database level to log any direct changes for the accounting softwares in use other than "Tally" used for maintaining books of account.
- The Companies (Auditor's Report) Order, 2020 ("the Order") issued by the Central Government of India in terms
 of sub-section (11) of section 143 of the Act, does not apply to this Company since it is a Company licensed to
 operate under Section 8 of the Companies Act 2013.

1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(i) CORPORATE INFORMATION

New Delhi Young Men's Christian Association is a charitable organization incorporated as a Company registered under Section 8 of the Companies Act, 2013 (Section 25 of the Companies Act, 1956/ Section 26 of the Indian Companies Act, VII of 1913) limited by Guarantee. It is also registered under section 12A (a) of the Income Tax Act, 1961 and its main objectives are Development of Body, Mind and Spirit of the young people of the Society irrespective of their caste or community. The Company is working for the Development of Spiritual, Intellectual, Physical and Social interest of People.

(ii) BASIS FOR PREPARATION OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The financial statements of the Company have been prepared in accordance with the generally accepted accounting principles in India (Indian GAAP). The Company has prepared these financial statements to comply with the accounting standards (Companies [Accounting Standard] Rules, 2006 as amended) notified under section 133 of the Companies Act 2013, read together with paragraph 7 of the Companies (Accounts) Rules 2021 and provisions of the Act (to the extent notified). The financial statements have been prepared on accrual basis and under the Historical Cost convention and ongoing Concern basis. The accounting policies adopted are consistent with those of the previous year.

The financial statements are presented in Indian Rupees (INR) and all values are rounded to the nearest Lakhs, except when otherwise indicated

(iii) USE OF ESTIMATES

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with the generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumption that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amount of revenues and expenses during the reporting year end. Although, these estimates are based upon management's best knowledge of current events and actions, actual results could differ from these estimates and the difference between the actual results and estimates are recognized in the period in which the results are known / materialized.

(iv) CURRENT- NON- CURRENT CLASSIFICATION

All assets and liabilities are classified into current and non-current as per the criteria provided in Schedule III of the Companies Act, 2013.

(v) PROPERTY PLANT & EQUIPMENT'S (TANGIBLE/ INTANGIBLE)

Property Plant & Equipment's are stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation/ amortization. Cost of acquisition is inclusive of inward freight, duties, taxes and incidental expenses related to acquisition. Intangible assets are stated at cost of acquisition less accumulated depreciation/ amortization. Earmarked donations for acquiring assets are credited to the General Reserve in case the Asset belongs to the Company. The Assets purchased out of the earmarked donations are thereafter capitalized.

(vi) DEPRECIATION & AMORTIZATION

Depreciation on tangible assets is charged on Written down Value method (WDV) over the useful life of the asset as provided Under Part C of Schedule II of the Companies Act, 2013, other than the following assets which are depreciated based on management's estimates of their remaining useful life.

- (1) Library Books, Based on useful life as certified by the Librarian.
- (2) Leasehold land which is provided equally over the lease period.
- (3) Building installed on leasehold land (other than on perpetual lease) is amortized over the respective lease period or over the remaining lease period from the date of construction, whichever is shorter.

(4) Intangible assets (computer software) are amortized over a period of 36 months. Amortization is done on straight line method.

Depreciation for the assets purchased/sold during the period is proportionately charged.

(vii) INVENTORIES

Provisions are valued at cost on FIFO basis. Stores and Spares are valued at cost on FIFO basis.

(viii) REVENUE RECOGNITION

Revenue is recognized to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the revenue can be reliably measured. Revenue for the various operations is recognized as under:

- (a) Revenue recognized from rendering of services is measured on the basis of performance of the completed services. Performance of the services is regarded as being achieved when no significant uncertainty exists regarding the amount of consideration that will be derived from rendering services.
- (b) Revenue from Hostel services is recognized as and when services are rendered.
- (c) Subscription from medical camps, camping of students and rural development programs etc. is recognized as and when collected.
- (d) License fee is recognized on accrual basis as per the terms and conditions of the agreement entered into with the licensee on an equitable straight-line basis.
- (e) Revenue of School Fees and various educational courses is recognized as and when it becomes due.
- (f) Interest earned on Earmarked Project Funds is credited to the respective Project fund.
- (g) Interest earned on non-earmarked fund is credited to revenue in the year of its accrual on time proportion basis taking into account the amount deposited and rate of interest. The income is stated in full with the tax deducted thereon being accounted for under the head tax refunds/ payments.
- (h) Membership fee is recognized as and when received
- (i) Claim from Government is recognized when acknowledged / paid.
- Income/ revenue exclude taxes and levies.

(ix) FOREIGN EXCHANGE TRANSACTIONS

Transactions in foreign exchange are recorded at the exchange rates prevailing on the date of the transaction. Resultant gain/loss arising on such transactions is recognized as income or expense in the Statement of Income & Expenditure.

(x) INVESTMENTS

Investments held by the Company in Government Bonds and Deposits with Non-Banking Financial Corporations are long term in nature and are stated at cost. All the investments including fixed deposits are in compliance with Section 11(5) of the Income Tax Act, 1961.

(xi) EMPLOYEE BENEFITS

Short Term Employee Benefit is recognized as an expense in the Statement of Income & Expenditure in the year in which related service is rendered.

Post-employment and other long term employee benefits are provided for in the Accounts in the following manner:

(a) Provident Fund and ESI contribution: Contribution is made with Provident Fund Commissioner and Employees State Insurance Corporation respectively; as per the provision of the Employees Provident Funds and Miscellaneous Provisions Act, 1952 and Employees State Insurance Corporation Act, 1948.

- (b) Gratuity: Maintained as a defined benefit retirement plan and contribution is made to The Life Insurance Corporation of India, as per Company's Scheme. Provision/ write back, if any, is made on the basis of the present value of the liability as at the Balance Sheet date determined by actuarial valuation following the Projected Unit Credit Method and is treated as liability.
- (c) Leave Encashment: Liability provided on actuarial basis as required by AS-15 on Employees Benefits.

(xii) GRANTS/ DONATION/ DESIGNATED FUNDS

Grants/ Donation/ Funds received for a particular project and interest earned on such earmarked project fund are recognized in the Statement of Income & Expenditure over the period necessary to match them with the related costs, which they are intended to compensate. The unutilized Grants/ Donation/Funds including interest thereon are reflected as a part of Project Fund. Other Grants/ Donation/Fund received without any specific direction are accounted for as revenue when received. The utilization of funds set up for a particular purpose is charged to respective fund Accounts.

(xiii) BORROWING COSTS

Borrowing costs directly attributable to the acquisition, construction, production or development of qualifying assets, which are assets that necessarily take a substantial period of time to get ready for their intended use or sale, are added to the cost of those assets, until such time as the assets are substantially ready for their intended use or sale. All other borrowing costs are recognized in Statement of Income & Expenditure in the period in which they are incurred.

(xiv) LEASES

In respect of assets namely land acquired under perpetual lease arrangements, the same are capitalized at the allotment cost of the land at the inception of the lease term. Additional payments are made as and when demanded by the authorities and are capitalized.

Leases where the lessor effectively retains substantially all the risks and benefits of ownership of the leased assets are classified as operating leases. Operating lease payments are recognized as expenditure in the Statement of Income and Expenditure.

Lease income from operating lease is recognized in the Statement of Income and Expenditure A/c on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

(xv) PRIOR PERIOD ADJUSTMENTS, EXTRA ORDINARY ITEMS AND CHANGES IN ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Prior period adjustments, extraordinary items and changes in accounting policies having material impact on the financial affairs of the Company are disclosed.

(xvi) PROVISIONS, CONTINGENT LIABILITIES AND CONTINGENT ASSETS

Provisions involving substantial degree of estimation in measurement are recognized when there is a present obligation as a result of past events and it is probable that there will be an outflow of resources. Contingent Liabilities are recognized only when there is possible obligation arising from past events due to occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Company or where any present obligation cannot be measured in terms of future outflow of resources or where a reliable estimate of the obligation cannot be made. The obligations are reviewed at each Balance Sheet date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimates. Contingent Assets are neither recognized nor disclosed in the financial statements.

(xvii) EVENTS AFTER THE BALANCE SHEET DATE

Events occurring after the date of the Balance Sheet, which affect the financial position to the material extent, are taken cognizance of.

(xviii) SEGMENT REPORTING

Since the company is a charitable organization registered under Section 8 of The Companies Act 2013, no disclosure under segment reporting is considered necessary.

- 27.During the year Company was engaged in activities for charitable purposes as defined under clause (15) of Section 2 of Income Tax Act, 1961. Further, the company is registered under section 12A of the Income Tax Act, 1961 with unique registration no. AAATN1200HE19857 and claims exemption under section 11 of the said Act. In view of these, the requirement of AS-22 is not applicable.
- 28.The Company was registered under FCRA vide registration no. 231660194 dated 04 August 2016. The Company had applied for renewal of its registration on 01 July 2021. Subsequent to the end of year, the application was refused for renewal for the following reasons:
 - "The enquiry revealed the association has not received nor utilized the Foreign Contribution in the last nine years for which FCRA registration was granted".
- 29. Contingent Liabilities not provided for in respect of claims against the company not acknowledged as debts:
 - (a) Income Tax matters where Company has preferred an appeal Rs. 596.37 Lakhs (FY 2022-23 Rs. 864.66 Lakhs)
 - (b) Income tax matters where income tax department has preferred an appeal against favourable orders decided in favour of the company - Rs. 978.95 Lakhs(FY 2022-23 – Rs. 978.95 Lakhs)

Further, against above demand, Income tax payment of Rs. 1333.82 Lakhs as on 31st March 2024 comprises of Tax Deducted at Source for various years and Rs. 27.60 Lakhs paid against demand for F.Y 2009 -10. & Rs. 8.32 Lakhs for A.Y-2010-11. The Company is registered under section 12A of the Income Tax Act 1961. The Company claimed and received refund of such tax from the Income Tax department for certain financial years. However, at the time of assessment, demand of tax was raised by the Department and the Income Tax refund for the subsequent years has been withheld. The Company has successfully contested these claims of the department at various forums.

The Company is registered under Section 12 (A) of the Income Tax Act, 1961 and applies its Income for various charitable activities. Based on different interpretation of the change in the terms of "charitable & religious in nature" in earlier years, the Income Tax Department treated the activities as non – charitable and raised demand of tax for various years. The company maintains that the activities of the Company are within the scope of its main objectives and are charitable in nature. As such, no taxes are payable by the company and hence no provision is considered necessary for Income Tax and other claim as the probability of the claims succeeding is remote.

The Company expects to recover all such Income Tax payments and accordingly the Income tax payments have been considered good and recoverable.

 Estimated number of Contracts remaining to be executed on Capital Account is for Rs. Nil (2023- Rs. NIL) as certified by the management.

31. Employee Benefits:

Defined Contribution Plans

The Company makes contribution towards Provident Fund and ESIC for qualifying employees. The Provident Fund and ESIC plans are operated by regional Provident Fund Commissioner and Director Employees State Insurance Corporation. The Company is required to contribute a specified percentage of payroll cost to the retirement benefit schemes to fund the benefits. The only obligation of the Company with respect to their retirement benefit plan is to make specified contribution at specified rates.

Defined Benefit Plan

Gratuity

The Company makes annual contribution to Employees Group Gratuity Scheme of Life Insurance Corporation of India (funded). The scheme provides for lump sum payments of an amount equal to 15/21 days salary (last drawn) for each completed year of service to vested employees on departure. Vesting occurs on completion of 5 years of service. The recent actuarial valuation was carried out for 31st March 2024 by Kapadia Global Actuaries under Projected Unit Credit Method. Provisions have been made to bring gratuity liability in line with actuarial valuation.


