








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REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

Your Directors have pleasure in submitting their Annual Report of the Company together with the Audited Statements of Accounts for the year ended 31st March, 2025.

1. FINANCIAL SUMMARY

The Company's Financial Performance for the financial year ended 31st March 2025 along with previous years' figures are given hereunder:

During the year under review, the Company reported a Total Revenue of ₹4,450.23 lakhs as compared to ₹4,467.66 lakhs in the previous year. Total Expenses stood at ₹4,335.91 lakhs as against ₹4,241.75 lakhs in the previous year.

The Excess of Income over Expenditure before Exceptional Items stood at ₹114.32 lakhs during FY 2024-25, as compared to ₹225.91 lakhs in FY 2023-24.

After accounting for Exceptional Items, the Company reported a Deficit of ₹20.10 lakhs for FY 2024-25 as against a Surplus of ₹15.63 lakhs in FY 2023-24.

The Board continues to focus on strengthening the Company's social initiatives, improving outreach and impact, and maintaining financial prudence for long-term sustainability.

2. DIVIDEND

There was no dividend declared by the Company during the year under Section 123 of the Companies Act, 2013 and the said provision is not applicable.

3. TRANSFER OF UNCLAIMED DIVIDEND TO INVESTOR EDUCTION AND PROTECTION FUND The provisions of Section 125(2) of the Companies Act, 2013 do not apply as there was no dividend declared and paid last year.

4. REVIEW OF BUSINESS OPERATIONS AND FUTURE PROSPECTS:

Your Directors are optimistic about company's objective and hopeful of consecutive better performance in next year. There was no change in the nature of business / activities of the company.



5. MATERIAL CHANGES AND COMMITMENT IF ANY AFFECTING THE FINANCIAL POSITION OF THE COMPANY OCCURRED BETWEEN THE END OF THE FINANCIAL YEAR TO WHICH THIS FINANCIAL STATEMENTS RELATE AND THE DATE OF THE REPORT

No material changes and commitments affecting the financial position of the Company occurred between the end of the financial year to which this financial statement relate on the date of this report.

11. EXPLANATION OR COMMENTS ON QUALIFICATIONS, RESERVATIONS OR ADVERSE REMARKS OR DISCLAIMERS MADE BY THE AUDITORS AND THE PRACTICING COMPANY SECRETARY IN THEIR REPORTS

The Board of Directors has taken note of the observations of the Statutory Auditors in their Report on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements [refer para (i)(vi)(a) and (b) of the Auditor's Report] as follows:

- (a) The software used for maintenance of sales & other records for the hostel services (which is part of maintenance of accounting records) of the Company did not have a feature of recording audit trail (edit log) facility.
- (b) The audit trail was not enabled at the database level to log any direct changes for the accounting software in use other than "Tally" used for maintaining books of account.

The Board would like to clarify that these are system-related limitations and have not impacted the integrity or correctness of the Company's books of accounts or financial statements. All underlying records and supporting documentation have been properly maintained to substantiate the transactions. The Company is in the process of evaluating and implementing appropriate software solutions/upgrades to ensure full compliance with the audit trail requirements going forward. The provisions relating to submission of Secretarial Audit Report is not applicable to the Company.

12. COMPANY'S POLICY RELATING TO DIRECTORS APPOINTMENT, PAYMENT OF REMUNERATION AND DISCHARGE OF THEIR DUTIES

The provisions of Section 178(1) relating to constitution of Nomination and Remuneration Committee are not applicable to the Company.

The Company being a section 8 companies under companies act, 2013, hence the provisions related to Deposits (Chapter V of the Act) are not applicable to it.

During the year under review, 7 Directors ceased to hold office and 7 Directors were appointed/reappointed on the Board.

19. DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENT DIRECTORS

The provisions of Section 149 for appointment of Independent Directors do not apply to the company.

20. ADEQUACY OF INTERNAL FINANCIAL CONTROLS WITH REFERENCE TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The Company has in place adequate internal financial controls with reference to financial statements. During the year under review, such controls were tested and no reportable material weakness in the design or operations were observed. Further, the Statutory Auditors of the Company have not reported any instance of fraud under Section 143(12) of the Companies Act, 2013 during the year under review.



21. STATUTORY AUDITORS

At the AGM held on 22nd September, 2021, the members of the company approved the appointment of M/s V. Sankar Aiyar & Co. Chartered Accountants, FRN 109208W as Statutory Auditors for a term of 5 years from the financial year 2021-22 onwards on such terms and conditions and remuneration as may be decided mutually. Accordingly, M/s V. Sankar Aiyar & Co., Chartered Accountants will continue as Statutory Auditors of the company till the financial year 2025-26 and hold the office until the conclusion of Annual General Meeting to be held in the year 2026. Further, vide notification dated May 7, 2018 as issued by Ministry of Corporate Affairs, the requirement seeking ratification of appointment of statutory auditors by members at each AGM has been done away, accordingly ratification is not required.

22. DISCLOSURE OF COMPOSITION OF AUDIT COMMITTEE AND PROVIDING VIGIL MECHANISM

The provisions of Section 177 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 6 and 7 of the Companies (Meetings of the Board and its Powers) Rules, 2013 is not applicable to the Company.

23. SAFE & CONDUCIVE WORKPLACE

The Company is committed to fostering a safe, inclusive, and supportive workplace for all its employees and strictly adheres to the provisions of the Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013 ("POSH Act"). The Company has constituted an Internal Complaints Committee (ICC) in accordance with the Act. Employee relations continued to remain cordial, enabling effective teamwork and collaboration across all levels. The Board of Directors places on record its sincere appreciation for the dedication, commitment, and valuable contributions made by employees during the year.

Further, during the year under review, no complaints were filed or were pending under the POSH Act.

During the year under review, maintenance of cost records as specified by the Central Government under sub-section (1) of section 148 of the Companies Act, 2013 is not required to be maintained by the Company.






Adventure Camp

Ms. Sheena Subroi, the event coordinator, led an engaging presentation that covered various aspects of female hygiene, including:

Daily Hygiene Practices. Importance of Cleanliness during Menstruation. Proper Disposal of Sanitary Products. Nutrition and Hydration for Menstrual Health.

Ms. Avantika Singh, a Committee Member facilitated an interactive session where students could ask questions and share their experiences. This session encouraged active participation and helped in clearing up common misconceptions about menstruation.

The session concluded with feedback from the students and teachers. Many students expressed their gratitude for the valuable information and felt more confident in managing their hygiene.

The orientation significantly increased awareness among students about the importance of maintaining personal hygiene and understanding menstrual health.

The event empowered adolescent girls by providing them with the knowledge and tools to take charge of their health. The Interactive Session fostered an open dialogue about menstruation reducing the stigma associated with it. Visit to Saraswati Publishing House

A group of forty students from classes VII and VIII of YMCA Public School visited Saraswati Publishing House on 02nd August 2024 to explore the various stages of Book Publishing. The visit aimed to enhance students understanding of how books are created and distributed, from initial conception to final production. This report outlines the key observations and insights from the visit including interactions with the staff, an overview of the machinery and procedures used in book production. The visit started with an overview of Saraswati Publishing House including its history, mission and the range of books it publishes. The students were introduced to key personnel and their roles within the organization.

The process of writing and submitting of manuscript by the author was discussed. The discussion covered the inspiration behind the book the drafting and revision process including the collaboration with editors and publishers. A publisher's role was explained including the key points like manuscript evaluation and selection, contract negotiation, editorial guidance, book development, marketing and distribution strategies.







The publishing house explained the importance of copyright registration for protecting the author's intellectual property. This involves registering the manuscript with relevant copyright offices. Authors sign contracts outlining the terms of publication including royalties, rights and responsibilities. Designers create cover art and interior layouts. The book's design is reviewed and approved before final production.

Students were given a tour of the printing facilities which included:

Pre-press: Preparation of digital files and proofs.

Printing: Printing of books using offset or Digital Printing Techniques. Students saw various types of printing presses and learned how they operate.

Binding: The methods used to bind books, including hardcover and paperback options.

Finishing Equipment: The process of adding final touches to the book such as trimming and covering.

The visit concluded with a Q & A session where students were asked questions about the publishing industry, career opportunities and the future of book publishing. The students were awarded prizes on every correct answer. Each student was presented a certificate of participation. The visit to Saraswati Publishing House provided students with a comprehensive understanding of the book publishing process. They gained valuable insights into the roles of authors, publishers and the technical aspects of printing and binding. The experience highlighted the collaborative effort required to bring a book from the author to the reader.





Accommodation Rooms and Meeting Halls



World Urban Network (WUN) 2024 CEOs Conference, Bogota, Colombia

On Day 2 of the conference delegates were taken to the various projects of the Bogota YMCA as per choice. The delegates from New Delhi YMCA selected visit to a Foster Home.

The Foster Home ensures a safe and caring environment for children, adolescents and young people who are in vulnerable situations or whose rights have been threatened. In doing so, the aim is to ensure their full development and the realization of their life projects, all based on the principles of the best interest of the child and the prevalence of their rights. Through this initiative, not only offer a temporary solution to adversity but also cultivate family life experiences and form strong emotional bonds.

It was quite an impressive experience for the delegates to have visited the foster home and to see the wonderful work that the Bogota YMCA is being doing for the local community.

A micro analysis of our Finances:

Robust Asset Base

- Total assets as of March 31, 2025, stand at ₹6592.41 lakhs, demonstrating significant holding in property, plant, equipment, investments, and receivables.
- Fixed assets (net block) maintained at strong levels, with capital expenditures indicating ongoing modernization and capacity improvements.

• Diversified Income Streams

- Multiple revenue sources: educational/hostel fees, seminars, membership, license fees, foreign currency income, and various donations.
- Income from operations for the year: ₹4,185.91 lakhs, and other income at 264.32 lakhs.

• Healthy Reserve Position

• Accumulated capital fund and reserves at ₹3,366.05 lakhs, providing cushions for contingencies and investment requirements.

• Strong Compliance & Controls

• Clean audit opinion with account preparation in accordance with Indian statutory requirements—no audit-qualified issues or major irregularities.

• Gratuity and Leave Encashment Provisions Adequate

• Detailed actuarial disclosure given; provisions align with actuarial liability.

Weaknesses

• Rising Operating Expenses

- Significant increase in employee benefit expenses (₹1,878.51 lakhs vs. ₹1,747.20 lakhs).
- Programme expenses and other overheads (utilities, security, commission, etc.) remain high.

• Dependence on Interest/Non-Operating Income

• Interest income are ongoing contributors, indicating reliance beyond core operations for some surplus.

Property Tax Disputes

• Unresolved property tax payables from earlier years remain, indicating exposure to statutory assessment risk.



Opportunities

• Asset Monetization and Yield Enhancement

• Leverage significant fixed assets and real estate for improved revenue generation (letting, events, etc.).

• Operational Efficiency Initiatives

- Process automation and strengthened receivables management for improved working capital flow.
- Cost rationalization in staff and other overhead-heavy segments.

Grant, Donation, and Partnership Potential

• Increase targeting for CSR, government, and foreign institution grants given established governance and compliance.

• Tax and Legal Settlements

 Several Income Tax cases adjudicated in favour of the company; positive future impact expected.

Threats

• Sustained Deficits or Erosion of Operating Surplus

- Continued shortfalls—if not checked—could erode reserves over time.
- Inflation and rising cost base may further pressure operating margins, especially if revenue growth stagnates.

• Receivable Recoverability Risk

• Extended receivable cycles may increase bad debt risk and impact cash flows, requiring vigilant credit policy and provisioning.

• Uncertain Statutory Liabilities

 Contingent liabilities and property tax issues could result in further outflows, as some matters are under adjudication.

• Asset Underutilization

Risk of not fully monetizing large fixed assets, leading to lower returns on investment.

• Regulatory and Compliance Scrutiny

• Changes in FCRA, tax exemption rules, or education sector regulation could bring additional compliance burden or restrict funding avenues.



Summing up, the New Delhi YMCA is fundamentally strong, with robust asset backing, high compliance, and diversified income. The main risks lie in collections, rising costs, and some legacy statutory disputes. Focused action on working capital management, operational efficiency, and proactive regulatory engagement is key to further strengthening the financial position.

To the Members of New Delhi Young Men's Christian Association

Report on the Audit of Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of New Delhi Young Men's Christian Association ("the Company") (a Not-for-Profit Company under Section 8 of the Companies Act, 2013), which comprise the Balance Sheet as at 31st March,2025, the Statement of Income & Expenditure, the Cash Flow Statement and a summary of the significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the aforesaid financial statements give the information required by the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act") in the manner so required and give a true and fair view in conformity with the Accounting Standards prescribed under section 133 of the Act read with Rule 3 of the Companies (Accounting Standards) Rules 2021 and accounting principles generally accepted in India, of the state of affairs of the Company as at 31st March, 2025, its deficit and its cash flows for the year ended on that date.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit of the financial statements in accordance with the Standards on Auditing (SAs) specified under section 143(10) of the Act. Our responsibilities under those Standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the financial statements section of our report. We are independent of the Company in accordance with the Code of Ethics issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India together with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements under the provisions of the Act and the Rules thereunder, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the Code of Ethics. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion on the financial statements.

Information Other than the financial statements and Auditor's Report Thereon

The Company's Board of Directors is responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the Director's report etc., but does not include the financial statements and our auditor's report thereon. The Director's report is expected to be made available to us after the date of this auditor's report.

Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and we will not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information identified above when it becomes available and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit, or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

When we read the Director's report, if we conclude that there is a material misstatement therein, we are required to communicate the matter to those charged with governance under SA 720 'The Auditor's responsibilities Relating to Other Information'.

Responsibilities of management and those charged with governance for the financial statements

The Company's Board of Directors is responsible for the matters stated in Section 134(5) of the Act with respect to the preparation of these financial statements that give a true and fair view of the financial position, financial performance and cash flows of the Company in accordance with the accounting principles generally accepted in India. This responsibility also includes maintenance of adequate accounting records in accordance with the provisions of the Act for safeguarding the assets of the Company and for preventing and detecting frauds and other irregularities; selection







and application of appropriate accounting policies; making judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal financial controls, that were operating effectively for ensuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and presentation of the financial statements that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, the Management is responsible for assessing the Company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the Management either intends to liquidate the Company or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

The Board of Directors are also responsible for overseeing the Company's financial reporting process.

The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances. Under section 143(3)(i) of the Companies Act, 2013, we are also responsible for expressing our opinion on whether the company has adequate internal financial controls system in place and the operating effectiveness of such controls.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Company's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Company to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and
 whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair
 presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.







We also provide those charged with governance with a statement that we have complied with relevant ethical requirements regarding independence, and to communicate with them all relationships and other matters that may reasonably be thought to bear on our independence, and where applicable, related safeguards.

Report on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements

- (b) In our opinion, proper books of account as required by law have been kept by the Company so far as it appears from our examination of those books except for the matter stated in paragraph (i) (vi) below on reporting under Rule 11(g);
- (c) The Balance sheet, the Statement of Income & Expenditure and the cash flow statement dealt with by this report are in agreement with the books of account;
- (d) In our opinion, the aforesaid financial statements comply with the Accounting Standards specified under Section 133 of the Act, read with Rule 3 of the Companies (Accounting Standards) Rules 2021;
- (e) The qualification relating to the maintenance of accounts and other matters concerned therewith are as stated in the paragraph (b) above on reporting under Rule 11(g) of the Companies (Audit and Auditors) Rules, 2014 (as amended);
- (f) On the basis of written representations received from the directors as on 31st March, 2025 taken on record by the Board of Directors, none of the directors is disqualified as on 31st March, 2024 from being appointed as a director in terms of Section 164 (2) of the Act;
- (g) With respect to the adequacy of the internal financial controls over financial reporting of the Company and the operating effectiveness of such controls, refer to our separate report in "Annexure A". Our report expresses an unmodified opinion on the adequacy and operating effectiveness of the Company's internal financial controls over financial reporting;
- (h) The Company has not paid or provided for any managerial remuneration during the year. Accordingly, reporting under section 197 (16) of the Act is not applicable;
- (i) With respect to the other matters to be included in the Auditor's Report in accordance with Rule 11 of the Companies (Audit and Auditors) Rules, 2014, in our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us:
 - i. The Company has disclosed the impact, if any, of pending litigations on its financial position in its financial statements Refer Note No. 29 to the financial statements;
 - ii. The Company does not have any long-term contracts including derivative contracts for which there were any material foreseeable losses;
 - iii. There were no amounts, which were required to be transferred during the year to the Investor Education and Protection Fund by the Company;
 - iv. (a) The management has represented that, to the best of its knowledge and belief, no funds (which are material either individually or in the aggregate) have been advanced or loaned or invested (either from borrowed funds or share premium or any other sources or kind of funds) by the company to or in any other person(s) or entity(ies), including foreign entities ("Intermediaries"), with the understanding, whether recorded in writing or otherwise, that the Intermediary shall, whether, directly or indirectly lend or invest in other persons or entities identified in any manner whatsoever by or on behalf of the company ("Ultimate Beneficiaries") or provide any guarantee, security or the like on behalf of the Ultimate Beneficiaries;
 - (b) The management has represented that, to the best of its knowledge and belief, no funds (which are material either individually or in the aggregate) have been received by the company from any person(s)







or entity(ies), including foreign entities ("Funding Parties"), with the understanding, whether recorded in writing or otherwise, that the company shall, whether, directly or indirectly, lend or invest in other persons or entities identified in any manner whatsoever by or on behalf of the Funding Party ("Ultimate Beneficiaries") or provide any guarantee, security or the like on behalf of the Ultimate Beneficiaries; and

- (c) Based on such audit procedures that we considered reasonable and appropriate in the circumstances, nothing has come to our notice that has caused us to believe that the representations under sub-clause (i) and (ii) contain any material misstatement.
- v. The companies having license under Section 8 of the Act are prohibited by their constitution from paying any dividend to its members. Hence the provisions are not applicable;
- vi. Based on our examination which included test checks, except for instance mentioned below, the Company in respect of financial year commencing on 1 April 2024, has used accounting software for maintaining its books of accounts which have a feature of recording audit trail (edit log) facility and the same have been operated throughout the year for all relevant transactions recorded in the software. Further, during the course of our audit we did not come across any instance of audit trail feature being tampered with in respect of the accounting software where such feature is enabled;
 - (a) The software used for maintenance of sales & other records for the hostel services (which is part of maintenance of accounting records) of the Company did not have a feature of recording audit trail (edit log) facility.
 - (b) The audit trail was not enabled at the database level to log any direct changes for the accounting software in use other than "Tally" used for maintaining books of account.
- 2. The Companies (Auditor's Report) Order, 2020 ("the Order") issued by the Central Government of India in terms of sub-section (11) of section 143 of the Act, does not apply to this Company since it is a Company licensed to operate under Section 8 of the Companies Act 2013.

1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(i) CORPORATE INFORMATION

New Delhi Young Men's Christian Association is a charitable organization incorporated as a Company registered under Section 8 of the Companies Act, 2013 (Section 25 of the Companies Act, 1956/ Section 26 of the Indian Companies Act, VII of 1913) limited by Guarantee. It is also registered under section 12A (a) of the Income Tax Act, 1961 and its main objectives are Development of Body, Mind and Spirit of the young people of the Society irrespective of their caste or community. The Company is working for the Development of Spiritual, Intellectual, Physical and Social interest of People.

(ii) BASIS FOR PREPARATION OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The financial statements of the Company have been prepared in accordance with the generally accepted accounting principles in India (Indian GAAP). The Company has prepared these financial statements to comply with the accounting standards (Companies [Accounting Standard] Rules, 2006 as amended) notified under section 133 of the Companies Act 2013, read together with paragraph 7 of the Companies (Accounts) Rules 2021 and provisions of the Act (to the extent notified). The financial statements have been prepared on accrual basis and under the Historical Cost convention and ongoing Concern basis. The accounting policies adopted are consistent with those of the previous year.

The financial statements are presented in Indian Rupees (INR) and all values are rounded to the nearest Lakhs, except when otherwise indicated

(iii) USE OF ESTIMATES

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with the generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumption that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amount of revenues and expenses during the reporting year end. Although, these estimates are based upon management's best knowledge of current events and actions, actual results could differ from these estimates and the difference between the actual results and estimates are recognized in the period in which the results are known / materialized.

(iv) CURRENT- NON- CURRENT CLASSIFICATION

All assets and liabilities are classified into current and non-current as per the criteria provided in Schedule III of the Companies Act, 2013.

(v) PROPERTY PLANT & EQUIPMENT'S (TANGIBLE/ INTANGIBLE)

Property Plant & Equipment's are stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation/ amortization. Cost of acquisition is inclusive of inward freight, duties, taxes and incidental expenses related to acquisition. Intangible assets are stated at cost of acquisition less accumulated depreciation/ amortization.

(vi) DEPRECIATION & AMORTIZATION

Depreciation on tangible assets is charged on Written down Value method (WDV) over the useful life of the asset as provided Under Part C of Schedule II of the Companies Act, 2013, other than the following assets which are depreciated based on management's estimates of their remaining useful life.

- (1) Library Books, Based on useful life as certified by the Librarian.
- (2) Leasehold land which is provided equally over the lease period.
- (3) Building installed on leasehold land (other than on perpetual lease) is amortized over the respective lease period or over the remaining lease period from the date of construction, whichever is shorter.
- (4) Intangible assets (computer software) are amortized over a period of 36 months. Amortization is done on straight line method.

Depreciation for the assets purchased/sold during the period is proportionately charged.

(vii) INVENTORIES

Provisions are valued at cost on FIFO basis. Stores and Spares are valued at cost on FIFO basis.



(viii) REVENUE RECOGNITION

NEW DELHI YMCA

Revenue is recognized to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the revenue can be reliably measured. Revenue for the various operations is recognized as under:

- (a) Revenue recognized from rendering of services is measured on the basis of performance of the completed services. Performance of the services is regarded as being achieved when no significant uncertainty exists regarding the amount of consideration that will be derived from rendering services.
- (b) Revenue from Hostel services is recognized as and when services are rendered.
- (c) Subscription from medical camps, camping of students and rural development programs etc. is recognized as and when collected.
- (d) License fee is recognized on accrual basis as per the terms and conditions of the agreement entered into with the licensee on an equitable straight-line basis.
- (e) Revenue of School Fees and various educational courses is recognized on accrual basis.
- (f) Interest earned on Earmarked Project Funds is credited to the respective Project fund.
- (g) Interest earned on non-earmarked fund is credited to revenue in the year of its accrual on time proportion basis taking into account the amount deposited and rate of interest. The income is stated in full with the tax deducted thereon being accounted for under the head tax refunds/ payments.
- (h) Membership fee is recognized as and when received
- (i) Claim from Government is recognized when acknowledged / paid.
- (i) Income/ revenue exclude taxes and levies.

(ix) FOREIGN EXCHANGE TRANSACTIONS

Transactions in foreign exchange are recorded at the exchange rates prevailing on the date of the transaction. Resultant gain/loss arising on such transactions is recognized as income or expense in the Statement of Income & Expenditure.

(x) INVESTMENTS

Investments held by the Company in Government Bonds and Deposits with Non-Banking Financial Corporations are long term in nature and are stated at cost. All the investments including fixed deposits are in compliance with Section 11(5) of the Income Tax Act, 1961.

(xi) EMPLOYEE BENEFITS

Short Term Employee Benefit is recognized as an expense in the Statement of Income & Expenditure in the year in which related service is rendered.

Post-employment and other long term employee benefits are provided for in the Accounts in the following manner:

- (a) **Provident Fund and ESI contribution:** Contribution is made with Provident Fund Commissioner and Employees State Insurance Corporation respectively; as per the provision of the Employees Provident Funds and Miscellaneous Provisions Act, 1952 and Employees State Insurance Corporation Act, 1948.
- (b) **Gratuity:** Maintained as a defined benefit retirement plan and contribution is made to The Life Insurance Corporation of India, as per Company's Scheme. Provision/write back, if any, is made on the basis of the present value of the liability as at the Balance Sheet date determined by actuarial valuation following the Projected Unit Credit Method and is treated as liability.
- (c) Leave Encashment: Liability provided on actuarial basis as required by AS-15 on Employees Benefits.



(xii) GRANTS/ DONATION/ DESIGNATED FUNDS

Grants/ Donation/ Funds received for a particular project and interest earned on such earmarked project fund are recognized in the Statement of Income & Expenditure over the period necessary to match them with the related costs, which they are intended to compensate. The unutilized Grants/ Donation/Funds including interest thereon are reflected as a part of Project Fund. Other Grants/ Donation/Fund received without any specific direction are accounted for as revenue when received. The utilization of funds set up for a particular purpose is charged to respective fund Accounts.

(xiii) BORROWING COSTS

Borrowing costs directly attributable to the acquisition, construction, production or development of qualifying assets, which are assets that necessarily take a substantial period of time to get ready for their intended use or sale, are added to the cost of those assets, until such time as the assets are substantially ready for their intended use or sale. All other borrowing costs are recognized in Statement of Income & Expenditure in the period in which they are incurred.

(xiv) LEASES

In respect of assets namely land acquired under perpetual lease arrangements, the same are capitalized at the allotment cost of the land at the inception of the lease term. Additional payments are made as and when demanded by the authorities and are capitalized.

Leases where the lessor effectively retains substantially all the risks and benefits of ownership of the leased assets are classified as operating leases. Operating lease payments are recognized as expenditure in the Statement of Income and Expenditure.

Lease income from operating lease is recognized in the Statement of Income and Expenditure A/c over the lease term.

(xv) PRIOR PERIOD ADJUSTMENTS, EXTRA ORDINARY ITEMS AND CHANGES IN ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Prior period adjustments, extraordinary items and changes in accounting policies having material impact on the financial affairs of the Company are disclosed.

(xvi) PROVISIONS, CONTINGENT LIABILITIES AND CONTINGENT ASSETS

Provisions involving substantial degree of estimation in measurement are recognized when there is a present obligation as a result of past events and it is probable that there will be an outflow of resources. Contingent Liabilities are recognized only when there is possible obligation arising from past events due to occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Company or where any present obligation cannot be measured in terms of future outflow of resources or where a reliable estimate of the obligation cannot be made. The obligations are reviewed at each Balance Sheet date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimates. Contingent Assets are neither recognized nor disclosed in the financial statements.

(xvii) EVENTS AFTER THE BALANCE SHEET DATE

Events occurring after the date of the Balance Sheet, which affect the financial position to the material extent, are taken cognizance of.

(xviii) SEGMENT REPORTING

Since the company is a charitable organization registered under Section 8 of The Companies Act 2013, no disclosure under segment reporting is considered necessary.



- 28. During the year Company was engaged in activities for charitable purposes as defined under clause (15) of Section 2 of Income Tax Act, 1961. Further, the company is registered under section 12A of the Income Tax Act, 1961 with unique registration no. AAATN1200HE19857 and claims exemption under section 11 of the said Act. In view of these, the requirement of AS-22 is not applicable.
- 29. The Company is not covered under Section 135 of the Companies Act 2013 for the year. Hence, disclosures related to Corporate Social Responsibility are not applicable.

The Company is carrying income tax refundable of Rs.1489.71 lacs as at 31st March 2025 pertaining to various assessment years from 2009-10 to 2025-26. The refund for earlier years have been withheld and adjusted against demand for subsequent years. The company expects to recover all such refunds.

The Company is registered under Section 12 (A) of the Income Tax Act, 1961 and applies its Income for various charitable activities. Based on different interpretation of the change in the terms of "charitable & religious in nature" in earlier years, the Income Tax Department treated the activities as non – charitable and raised demand of tax for various years. The company maintains that the activities of the Company are within the scope of its main objectives and are charitable in nature. This has been confirmed by the Department vide its order Dated 28.07.2025 for A/Y 2022-23. During the financial year notice was received from CIT(E) towards cancellation of 12A registration. Based on the various representations and submissions made by the company, cancellation of registration proceedings as per Section 12AB (4)(b) of the Income Tax Act 1961 has been dropped by CIT (E) vide Notice dtd. 30.06.2025.

As such, no taxes are payable by the company and hence no provision is considered necessary for Income Tax and other claim as the probability of the claims succeeding is remote.

31. Estimated number of Contracts remaining to be executed on Capital Account is for **Rs. Nil** (2024- Rs. NIL) as certified by the management.



32. Employee Benefits:

Defined Contribution Plans

The Company makes contribution towards Provident Fund and ESIC for qualifying employees. The Provident Fund and ESIC plans are operated by regional Provident Fund Commissioner and Director Employees State Insurance Corporation. The Company is required to contribute a specified percentage of payroll cost to the retirement benefit schemes to fund the benefits. The only obligation of the Company with respect to their retirement benefit plan is to make specified contribution at specified rates.

Defined Benefit Plan

Gratuity

The Company makes annual contribution to Employees Group Gratuity Scheme of Life Insurance Corporation of India (funded). The scheme provides for lump sum payments of an amount equal to 15/21 days salary (last drawn) for each completed year of service to vested employees on departure. Vesting occurs on completion of 5 years of service. The recent actuarial valuation was carried out for the year ended 31st March 2025 by Kapadia Global Actuaries under Projected Unit Credit Method. Necessary provisions has been made to account gratuity liability in line with actuarial valuation.


