The business year began under an unprecedented Lockdown with uncertainty all around into an unknown future for everyone. We at New

All glory to the Lord, as with each subsequent un-locking, the activities and programmes started resuming, with the restrictive Covid protocols in place. With perseverance, we could silently revive the NDY to a new lean and focused organization.

As you are all aware, we had a very smooth changeover at the top executive level with Mr. Mark Clive taking over as the GS & CEO. The secretarial cadre was further strengthened and the overall succession issue is being given the top priority by your Board. ERP and Digitalisation processes are being further fine-tuned while the Human Resources are being optimised and streamlined.

The outreach project at Sattal has been consolidated by starting a Programme Centre at the Dorothy Villa at Mehragaon. The long pending disposal of the Almora property was completed and in lieu the Dorothy villa was acquired. The hospitality venture has also been further augmented at the Sattal Campsite.

The YMCA Public School at Nizamuddin is going ahead with all the guns blazing, despite Covid restrictions, after having procured nearly all the statutory compliances and the CBSE affiliation.



Many pending issues including financial recoveries from Government Authorities have been brought to their

closures. Many more such legacy issues are being looked into rigorously for adherences or compliances. That

is Triumph!

Unfortunately, the year again ended with the start of the second and more disastrous wave of the Pandemic.

Thankfully, we are more prepared this time as far as the operational front is concerned.

Lastly, while we go through the Annual Report, there are some more fundamental and nagging questions we

need to ask ourselves.

a) How relevant are the programmes and activities of YMCA today?

b) Why are we at the YMC $\Lambda$ , to serve or to get served?

c) Are we still committed enough to be associated with YMCA or is it time to make room for others?

Chartered Accountants will continue as statutory auditors of the company till the financial year 2025-26 and hold the office until the conclusion of Annual General Meeting to be held in the year 2026.

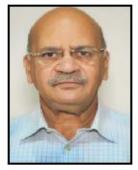

## **REPORT OF THE GENERAL SECRETARY & CEO**

Dear Members, Greetings!

The year 2020-21 was a Challenge to take the institution through the crisis caused by Pandemic. The challenge in past 16 months has been to sustain NDY in unprecedented pandemic situation. YMCA Education Sector was struggling as parents and children were not sure of the re-opening of educational institutions, delay in 10+2 exams & results and above all parents finding it difficult to finance their children's education due to salary cuts and loss of jobs etc, ultimately adversely impacting intake of admissions in NDY



educational activities. Hospitality industry too was closed for most of the time in past 16 months. Tourist Hostel, Greater Noida Programme Centre and Sattal operations were standstill throughout. Swimming Pool and Fitness centre too were closed. Thus, the inflow of cash was drying up and fixed monthly cost was a big concern.

Another big challenge was to keep the morale high of the staff by continuous counselling and interaction.

The Lord continued to show us the way to go through the crisis and we could take some important pending matters to the logical conclusion which were in waiting for years and decades.

While economy is down, like minded organizations in M/s ASSOCHEM and National Pharmaceutical Pricing Authority, Government of India came in form of licensees in Cultural Centre to provide some relief to our finances.

Pending issue for past 8 years with Greater Noida Authority, Government with regards to refund of land compensation Rs.1.31 cr was sorted out. Another pending issue for 15 years with regards to water bills of GNPC too was brought to its logical conclusion and settled.

Rigorously followed up with Government of Delhi to claim compensation towards Tourist Hostel facilities used for COVID19 isolation centre in April-July 2020. The Government formed committee has recommended compensation payable to Tourist Hostel.

Fire NOC for Cultural Centre Building pending for over 3 years was obtained.

Pending issue for over 3 years of creating Fire Escape from the basement of Fitness Centre was sorted out by complying to the need and shifted the fitness Centre back to its original location.

The Education team in no time shifted to online technology to carry forward the Mission viz imparting education, admission process, delivery of lectures, examinations, result etc.

YMCA Public School too had shifted to online technology before commencement of the academic session. Nizamuddin Centre over the years has been sustaining with subsidy from corporate Office for almost past 4 decades, is now first time on its own. In past 12 months, YPS obtained all statutory NOCs/compliance certificates from Government agencies, recognition from Directorate of Education and finally has been approved for affiliation by CBSE.

The Tourist hostel was on back foot due to pandemic situation, Government Advisories, complete shut down of Aviation & Hospitality Industries and take over by Government of Delhi under Disaster Management Act to convert it into a COVID isolation centre.

While things were looking little better in February- March 2021, COVID wave in April – June 2021 once again dented all programmes and revenue generation plans. However, July and August 2021 have shown encouraging results and hope future months of the current year will be better.

While NDY goes through the crisis has taken some futuristic decisions as well. A 24 rooms Lake View Inn taken over as yet another futuristic initiative to make Sattal a self reliant operation.

A decision of discontinuing with a non-productive asset at Almora was pending since 2004 was executed successfully in February 2021. Another decision which was pending for over 8 to 9 years to setup a Programme Centre in Uttrakhand as a replacement for Almora Centre viz Dorothy Villa was taken to its logical conclusion in February 2021. The Programme Centre is to extend NDY Mission for Social upliftment of the deprived and community at large in Uttrakhand.

As per Plan 2020-25, Lake View Inn and Campsite to generate revenue to support the whole Sattal project.

Most importantly, we ensured that all infrastructure was kept in good condition to restart or reset NDY operations within 48 hrs of Government advisories.

I am grateful to Almighty God for His blessings and guidance enabling New Delhi YMCA to sustain and move on during this difficult time of Pandemic. I am thankful to the President, Members of the Board of Directors for their continuous guidance, Members for their patience & support, Secretaries, Executives and the entire team of staff for their efforts and commitment.

I firmly believe that God will take New Delhi YMCA through this crisis as the Bible says "Jesus said to him, if you can believe, all things are possible to him who believes" Mark 9:23

May God bless you all.

#### New Delhi YMCA Felicitated for Humanitarian Service

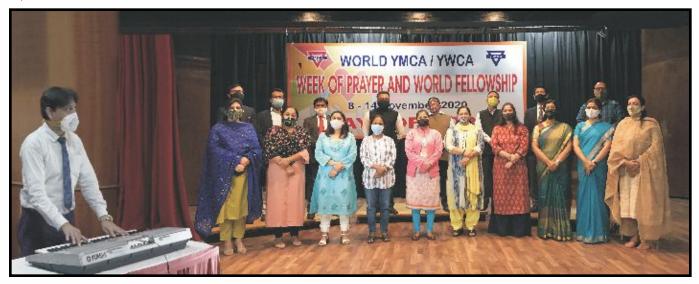

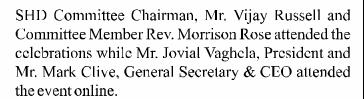






**International Women's Day:** The annual International Women's Day celebration was held on 8<sup>th</sup> March 2021.

Mr. Tejpal Singh, Founder-STAD Enterprises apprised the participants of the availability of Software for Online classes and the Safety Tools to deal with Online Threats like- Phishing, Malware, Cyber-bullying, Identity Theft, Zoom Bombing and Hacking etc. He also outlined Best practices for Online Classes for example - ensuring that the solution is encrypted, registration required by all to attend sessions, 'Join Before Host', Stop Screening for all by default etc.

The second part of the session was conducted on the topic - Online Classroom Safety. This was further sub divided into three levels - Online Classroom Safety in Primary School, Middle school and for the senior students levels. Ms. Deepti Kamaal outlined all the safety measures that their school is undertaking to keep the online platform safe for the Pre - Primary till Grade III.

- Digital Citizenship Agreements (Responsible use of online and digital technology) e.g.- being kind and respectful in the classroom and on social media, protecting their and others private information.
- Classroom practices Keep the camera on, mike off, no chatting/texting, positive remarks only
- Free background space: sit in a place where the parents are able to keep an eye on their wards' screen.
- Internet filters (parental control software)
- Monitoring Parents should check what the child is doing, including checking child's online surfing history.

Ms. Sihota from British School, discussed Digital Citizenship while conducting Online classes for the students of Middle School. She stressed upon the multiple malpractices that teachers and learners may face like Phishing, Piracy, Cyber-stalking, Obscenity etc. She also discussed Online Learning Challenges faced by all like:

- Internet issues
- High Quality teaching and learning
- Academic Honesty/Assessments
- 1-1 meetings

YMCA

Ms. Simi Malhotra from K.R. Mangalam World School presented her views on the topic from the perspective of the Senior School teachers. Ms. Malhotra discussed issues faced while teaching online and the subsequent precautions that should be taken.

The panelist discussed about the need to 'Report Online Abuse'. POCSO Act Section 21 which deals with cyber crimes related to technology and that the parents and teachers should be well aware of.

Christmas Programme: Greater Noida Programme Centre organized the Christmas Programme on 17th December 2020.

A gathering of 50 people (due to the COVID 19 restrictions imposed by the Government of UP) attended the program. All the protocols during the pandemic were maintained.

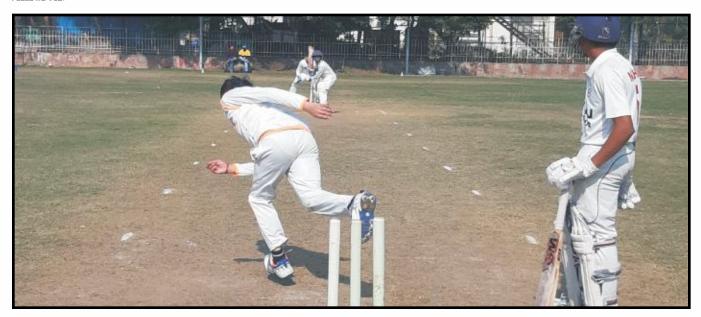

# YMCA CAMPSITE CUM PROGRAMME CENTRE, SATTAL

In the Economic fallout due to the Covid pandemic had its impact on the hospitality industry and YMCA Campsite cum Programme Centre, Sattal was no exception. Due to the heavy restrictions imposed by the Central and State Governments tourism was impacted adversely causing heavy shortfall in income.

The initial spade work of identifying the migrant labourers from UP, Bihar, Jharkhand and Nepal was done by Mr. Rana, Patwari, Mrs. Upreti, Sabhasad and Mr. Pawan Shah. During the survey some local poor families were also identified who had no source of income due to the lockdown.

First Phase - 6 to 10 April 2020:

During the first phase of the distribution over 306 ration packets were distributed mainly in the Bhimtal and Naukuchiatal area covering Block Road, Vikas Bhawan area, By Pass Road, Bhimtal Dam, Son gaon and Dungshil.

Second Phase – 22 April to 10 May 2020

During this phase a larger area was covered. Over 375 Ration packets were distributed in areas like Block Road, Vikas Bhawan area, By Pass Road, Bhimtal Dam, Song a on, Dungshil, Suryagaon, Mehragaon, Bhaktyuda, Nisaula, DobLewshal and Farsauli. During this phase the Police Station, Bhowali requested contribution of 30 packets to be given to labourers from UP & Bihar stuck in Amritpur stone mines.





Third Phase – 16 May 2020

The Naib Tehsildaar of Betaalghat, Nainital sent a request for 100 packets for poor families in the Betaalghat Tehsil area who had not source of income. These packets were handed over to the Naib Tehsildaar on Saturday 16 May 2020.

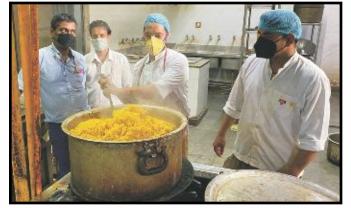
# **TOURIST HOSTEL CUM PROGRAMME CENTRE**

# Served food to the poor:

Tourist Hostel responding to the need of the hour took up the challenge to cook food for the poor and labour community stranded on roads in the areas from Barakhamba Road to Asaf Ali road. 1000 packets of cooked food was distributed daily with the assistance of Delhi Police. The Tourist Hostel also served food for COVID 19 patients housed in Mount Carmel School, Isolation Centre.













#### **COVID19 Isolation Centre:**

On 22<sup>nd</sup> April 2020 in pursuance of the Disaster Management Act the Delhi Government took over the Tourist Hostel cum Programme Centre to combat the Novel Corona Virus COVID19. It was used to house Symptomatic and Asymptomatic patients. The Government of Delhi vacated the Tourist Hostel on 6<sup>th</sup> July 2020.



**Tourist Hostel Facilities:** The 100 rooms Tourist Hostel cum Programme Centre situated in heart of the capital city, provides reasonably priced boarding and lodging facility for social, cultural & intellectual forums, conferences, seminars, management development workshops etc. Ideally located within close proximity to Government offices, Connaught Place, historic monuments.

# REPORT OF THE HONORARY TREASURER

The ND YMCA Treasurer's Annual report is intended to summarise and comment on the financial position of the ND YMCA and related matters. It should be read together with the audited accounts for the year ended 31st March 21.



#### Effects of COVID 19

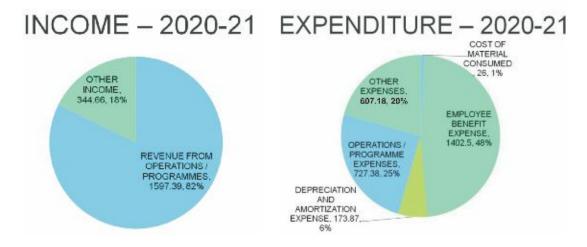
The 2020-21 fiscal year was derailed by the COVID 19 Crisis. COVID19 pandemic has resulted in a near total closure of certain activities, with great financial constraints on the stakeholders — Management, Staff, Members, parents and students, guests etc. Our Educational programmes including allied education programmes have been adversely affected. Not surprisingly, the Tourism Industry in India has been through an extremely challenging period and has thus affected our Tourist Hostel revenue.

We all had faced a completely unprecedented crisis due to the spread of corona virus all around the world. However, this time has taught us how to build foundations of resilience to face difficult events in future.

#### **Business Continuity**

Ever since the lockdown struck the Country in March 2020, the ND YMCA has been up front in keeping pace with changing times. We prepared our path to deal with the crisis with some new tools. Suddenly, online learning has become a critical lifeline for education and ND YMCA was one of the first in this area to initiate online classes. The online classes with all its hurdles, hiccups and challenging difficulties started in April 2020. Employees continued to work from home while operations started gradually as per Government directives. Entire Finance & Accounting operations including collection of Fees etc. and payments of Salaries as well as payments to vendors started on digital platform. ERP system was introduced for better functioning of administration. This system helped a lot and benefits were known only when we faced this challenge of a lockdown.

#### **Financial Position**





Revenue generation operations got affected due to Covid19 advisories, lockdown, lack of opportunities etc. and thus the deficit increased to Rs. 994.88 lacs (after Depreciation and amortisation expense) compared to the deficit of 185.31 lacs last year. Revenue from Operations / Programmes fell to Rs. 1597.39 Lacs from 3555.78 lacs last year. On the other hand Operations / Programmes expenses also fell to 727.38 lacs from 1521.96 lacs due to curtailment of programmes and activities as a result of COVID 19 pandemic.

As far as non-operating Income is concerned it has come down to Rs. 344.66 lacs from 387.30 lacs last year. On the other hand the Employee benefit expense & other expenses also fell as compared to last year.

# **Concluding Remarks**

As an eventful year comes to close, I thank God, for his abundant blessings, in all our endeavours. Let us also pray that he continues to guide us to carry forward and maintain a steady growth both in terms of revenue and capacity to reach out to people from all sections of society for achievement of the mission and objectives of the YMCA movement in the coming years, especially in times of difficult economic conditions, that we all continue to experience.

I express, my profound gratitude, to the Board of Directors for their help and constant support. I take this opportunity, to thank, Members, General Secretary / CEO & his team, for their dedication as well as to our Statutory Auditors M/s. KAMG & Associates, Chartered Accountants and our Internal Auditors M/s. S S Kothari Mehta & Co., Chartered Accountants for all their professional support.

I hope that we will be able to cross, many milestones, and achieve greater success in coming years. It is my desire to have fixed income equal to fixed costs to ensure that in case of any contingencies, situations beyond our control, we do not go into deficit.

**Report on the Financial Statements** 

# **Opinion**

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of **New Delhi Young Men's Christian Association** ("the Company") which comprise the Balance Sheet as at 31<sup>st</sup> March, 2021, the Statement of Income and Expenditure, the Cash Flow Statement for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information (hereinafter referred to as "the Financial Statements").

In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the aforesaid financial statements give the information required by the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act") in the manner so required and give a true and fair view in conformity with the Accounting Standards prescribed under section 133 of the Act read with Rule 7 of the Companies (Accounting Standards) Rules, 2014, as amended, and other accounting principles generally accepted in India, of the state of affairs of the Company as at March 31, 2021, and its excess of expenditure over income and its cash flows for the year ended on that date.

# **Basis for Opinion**

We conducted our audit of the financial statements in accordance with standards on Auditing (SAs) specified under section 143(10) of the Act. Our responsibilities under those Standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. # **Emphasis of Matters**

We draw your attention to the note No. 29 to the financial statements with regard to amount recoverable from Income Tax Department aggregating to Rs. 10,75,31,975 in respect of tax deducted at source/ taxes paid on demand for various assessment years for which no provision has been considered necessary for reasons stated thereto

Our opinion is not modified in respect of the above matter.

# **Management responsibility for the Financial Statements**

The Company's Board of Director's is responsible for the matter stated in Section 134 (5) of the Act with respect to the preparation and presentation of these financial statements that give a true and fair view of the financial position and financial performance of the company in accordance with the Accounting Standards specified under section 133 of the Act read with Rule 7 of the Companies (Accounts) Rules, 2014 and other accounting principles generally accepted in India.



This responsibility also includes maintenance of adequate accounting records, in accordance with the provisions of the Act for safeguarding the assets of the Company and for preventing and detecting frauds and other irregularities; selection and application of appropriate accounting policies; making judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal financial controls, that were operating effectively for ensuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and presentation of the financial statements that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Company or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

The Board of Directors are responsible for overseeing the Company's financial reporting process.

We also provide those charged with governance with a statement that we have complied with relevant ethical requirements regarding independence, and to communicate with them all relationships and other matters that may reasonably be thought to bear on our independence, and where applicable, related safeguards.

From the matters communicated with those charged with governance, we determine those matters that were of most significance in the audit of the financial statements of the current period and are therefore the key audit matters. We describe these matters in our auditor's report unless law or regulation precludes public disclosure about the matter or when, in extremely rare circumstances, we determine that a matter should not be communicated in our report because the adverse consequences of doing so would reasonably be expected to outweigh the public interest benefits of such communication.

#### NOTES TO ACCOUNTS

#### 1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### CORPORATE INFORMATION

New Delhi Young Men's Christian Association is a charitable organization incorporated as a Company registered under Section 8 of the Companies Act, 2013 (Section 25 of the Companies Act, 1956). It is also registered under section 12A (a) of the Income Tax Act, 1961 and its main objectives are Development of Body, Mind and Spirit of the young people of the Society irrespective of their caste or community. The Company is working since 1927 for the Development of Spiritual, Intellectual, Physical and Social interest of People.

#### BASIS FOR PREPARATION OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The financial statements of the Company have been prepared in accordance with the generally accepted accounting principles in India (Indian GAAP). The Company has prepared these financial statements to comply with the accounting standards (Companies [Accounting Standard] Rules, 2006 as amended) notified under section 133 of the Companies Act 2013, read together with paragraph 7 of the Companies (Accounts) Rules 2014 and provisions of the Act (to the extent notified). The financial statements have been prepared on accrual basis (except Membership Fees) and under the Historical Cost convention and ongoing Concern basis. The accounting policies adopted are consistent with those of the previous year.

#### **USE OF ESTIMATES**

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with the generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumption that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amount of revenues and expenses during the reporting year end. Although, these estimates are based upon management's best knowledge of current events and actions, actual results could differ from these estimates and the difference between the actual results and estimates are recognized in the period in which the results are known / materialized.

#### FIXED ASSETS (Tangible/Intangible)

Fixed Assets are stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation/ amortization. Cost of acquisition is inclusive of inward freight, duties, taxes and incidental expenses related to acquisition. Intangible assets are stated at cost of acquisition less accumulated depreciation/ amortization. Earmarked donations for acquiring assets are credited to the General Reserve in ease the Asset belongs to the Company. The Assets purchased out of the earmarked donations are thereafter capitalized.



#### **DEPRECIATION & AMORTIZATION**

Depreciation on tangible assets is charged on Written down Value method (WDV) over the useful life of the asset as provided Under Part C of Schedule II of the Companies Act, 2013, other than the following assets which are depreciated based on management's estimates of their remaining useful life.

- (1) Library Books, Based on useful life as certified by the Librarian.
- (2) Leasehold land which is provided equally over the lease period.
- (3) Building installed on leasehold land (other than on perpetual lease) is amortized over the respective lease period or over the remaining lease period from the date of construction, whichever is shorter.

Intangible assets (computer software) are amortized over a period of 36 months. Amortization is done on straight line method.

Depreciation for the assets purchased/sold during the period is proportionately charged.

#### INVENTORIES

Provisions are valued at cost to the FIFO method. Medicines, Stores and Spares are valued at cost on FIFO basis.

#### REVENUE RECOGNITION

Revenue is recognized to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the revenue can be reliably measured. Revenue for the various operations is recognized as under:

- a) Revenue recognized from rendering of services is measured on the basis of performance of the completed services. Performance of the services is regarded as being achieved when no significant uncertainty exists regarding the amount of consideration that will be derived from rendering services.
- b) Revenue from Hostel services is recognized as and when services are rendered.
- c) Subscription from medical clinic, camping of students and rural development programs etc. is recognized as and when collected.
- d) License fee is recognized on accrual basis as per the terms and conditions of the agreement entered into with the licensee on an equitable straight line basis.
- e) Revenue of various educational courses is recognized as and when it becomes due.
- f) Interest earned on Farmarked Project Funds is credited to the respective Project fund.
- g) Interest carned on non-earmarked fund is credited to revenue in the year of its accrual on time proportion basis taking into account the amount deposited and rate of interest. The income is stated in full with the tax deducted thereon being accounted for under the head tax refunds/ payments.
- h) Membership fee is recognized as and when received
- i) Claim from Government is recognized when acknowledged / paid.



Income/ revenue exclude taxes and levies.

#### FOREIGN EXCHANGE TRANSACTIONS

Transactions in foreign exchange are recorded at the exchange rates prevailing on the date of the transaction. Resultant gain/loss arising on such transactions is recognized as income or expense in the Statement of Income & Expenditure.

#### **INVESTMENTS**

Investments held by the Company in Government Bonds and Deposits with Non- Banking Financial Corporations are long term in nature and are stated at cost. All the investments including fixed deposits are in compliance with Section 11(5) of the Income Tax Act, 1961.

#### **EMPLOYEE BENEFITS**

Short Term Employee Benefit is recognized as an expense in the Statement of Income & Expenditure in the year in which related service is rendered.

Post-employment and other long term employee benefits are provided for in the Accounts in the following manner:

- a) Provident Fund and ESI contribution: Contribution is made with Provident Fund Commissioner and Employees State Insurance Corporation respectively; as per the provision of the Employees Provident Funds and Miscellaneous Provisions Λct, 1952 and Employees State Insurance Corporation Act, 1948.
- b) Gratuity: Maintained as a defined benefit retirement plan and contribution is made to The Life Insurance Corporation of India, as per Company's Scheme. Provision/ write back, if any, is made on the basis of the present value of the liability as at the Balance Sheet date determined by actuarial valuation following the Projected Unit Credit Method and is treated as liability.
- e) Leave Encashment: Liability provided on actuarial basis as required by AS-15 on Employees Benefits.

#### GRANTS/DONATION/DESIGNATED FUNDS

Grants/ Donation/ Funds received for a particular project and interest earned on such earmarked project fund are recognized in the Statement of Income & Expenditure over the period necessary to match them with the related costs, which they are intended to compensate. The unutilized Grants/ Donation/Funds including interest thereon are reflected as a part of Project Fund. Other Grants/ Donation/Fund received without any specific direction are accounted for as revenue when received. The utilization of funds set up for a particular purpose is charged to respective fund Accounts.



#### LEASES

In respect of assets namely land acquired under perpetual lease arrangements, the same are capitalized at the allotment cost of the land at the inception of the lease term. Additional payments are made as and when demanded by the authorities and are capitalized.

Leases where the lessor effectively retains substantially all the risks and benefits of ownership of the leased assets are classified as operating leases. Operating lease payments are recognized as expenditure in the Statement of Income and Expenditure.

# PRIOR PERIOD ADJUSTMENTS, EXTRA ORDINARY ITEMS AND CHANGES IN ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Prior period adjustments, extraordinary items and changes in accounting policies having material impact on the financial affairs of the Company are disclosed.

#### PROVISIONS, CONTINGENT LIABILITIES AND CONTINGENT ASSETS

Provisions involving substantial degree of estimation in measurement are recognized when there is a present obligation as a result of past events and it is probable that there will be an outflow of resources. Contingent Liabilities are recognized only when there is possible obligation arising from past events due to occurrence or nonoccurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Company or where any present obligation cannot be measured in terms of future outflow of resources or where a reliable estimate of the obligation cannot be made. The obligations are reviewed at each Balance Sheet date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimates. Contingent Assets are neither recognized nor disclosed in the financial statements.

#### EVENTS AFTER THE BALANCE SHEET DATE

Events occurring after the date of the Balance Sheet, which affect the financial position to the material extent, are taken cognizance of.



- 24. During the year Company was engaged in activities for charitable purposes as defined under clause (15) of Section 2 of Income Tax Act, 1961. Further, the company is registered under section 12A of the Income Tax Act, 1961 and claims exemption under section 11 of the said Act. In view of these, the requirement of AS-22 is not applicable.

# 27. Employee Benefits:

#### 27.1. Defined Contribution Plans

The Company makes contribution towards Provident Fund and ESIC for qualifying employees. The Provident Fund and ESIC plans are operated by regional Provident Fund Commissioner and Director Employees State Insurance Corporation. The Company is required to contribute a specified percentage of payroll cost to the retirement benefit schemes to fund the benefits. The only obligation of the Company with respect to their retirement benefit plan is to make specified contribution at specified rates.

#### 27.2. Defined Benefit Plan

#### **27.2.1.** Gratuity

The Company makes annual contribution to Employees Group Gratuity Scheme of Life Insurance Corporation of India (funded). The scheme provides for lump sum payments of an amount equal to 15 21 days salary (last drawn) for each completed year of service to vested employees on departure. Vesting occurs on completion of 5 years of service. The recent actuarial valuation was carried out for 31<sup>st</sup> March 2021 by LIC of India under Projected Unit Cost Method. Provisions have been made to bring gratuity liability in line with actuarial valuation. The funds are invested by LIC of India.

39 The Company has acquired land at Greater Noida on perpetual lease. The initial payment has been capitalized and all subsequent demands for additional compensation has also been capitalized as and when been deposited. Subsequently, it was learnt that the demand for additional compensation was not correct and accordingly, the Company has made claim from the Greater Noida Development Authority for refund of such payment of additional compensation and recognized an amount of Rs 1, 31, 49,375 as recoverable from the Authority with corresponding credit being given to land account. Amount has been realized subsequently. The Company is looking into the possibility of making claim for interest on this amount.

40 During the year, the Government of NCT of Delhi has taken over the Tourist Hostel to be utilized for Covid Isolation Centre under the Delhi Disaster Management Act, 2005 for the period 22nd April 20 to 6th July 20. Compensation claim of Rs. 190 Lacs for the same has been made during the year. The Government has considered the claim. However, it did not agree on the rate claimed and notified the rate to be paid for the rooms occupied. This matter of occupancy is now under negotiation with the Authority. This claim will be accounted for once the matter is finalized.
